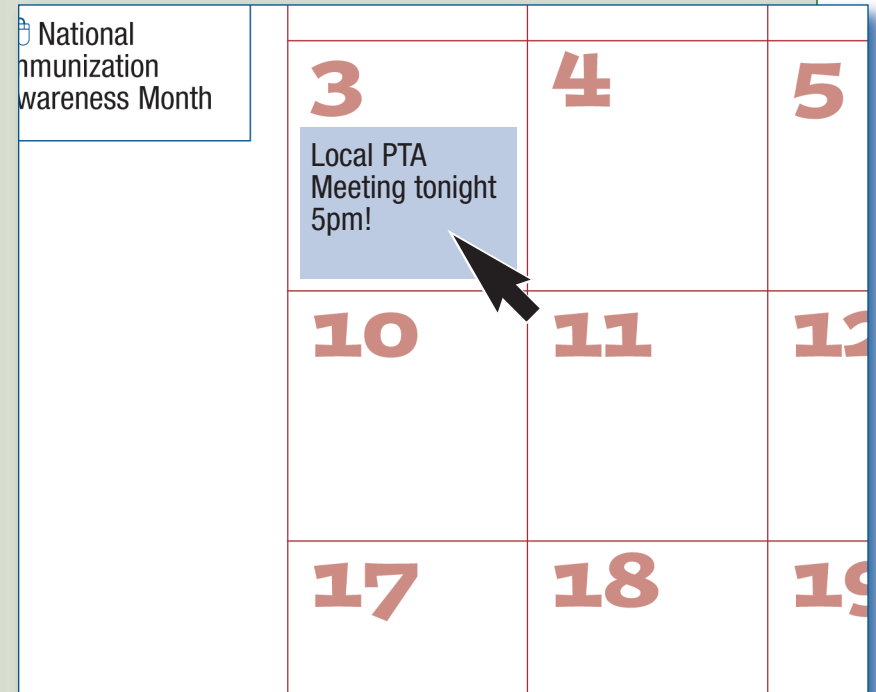

How to Customize the PTA Parent's Calendar

The customizable PTA Parent's Calendar (available at PTA.org) is designed to help parents stay involved in their school community and participate in PTA and school activities.

Each day of each calendar month contains a customizable field in which you can insert events, activities, and other information specific to your child, PTA, and school. To highlight the customizable fields on the calendar, click the box next to "highlight fields" in the instructions bar in the upper right-hand corner of the screen. PTA national events and other national celebrations are included on the calendar, with links (🔗) to more information. Each month's calendar page can be printed out individually, duplicated, and shared with other parents and PTA members, as well as school officials, to help you plan to participate in the life of the school.

The calendar is in portable document format (PDF). You may need to download and install the latest version of Adobe Reader to view and print the calendar. **Adobe Reader is free software available from Adobe at www.adobe.com/products/reader/.** You can view, fill in, and print the calendar pages with the free version of the software. **However, unless you have Adobe Acrobat, you will not be able to save the calendar with your information filled in.** Adobe Reader will not allow you to save your changes. Collect all the information you will need before sitting down to customize the calendar. Before you enter any information, make sure you will be able to print the pages from the computer at which you are working.

Has your child completed their summer reading list? Have you met your child's teacher or teachers for the new school year? Take time now to make a checklist of things to do before the start of this school year. This will help your child enter school ready to learn on the first day.

- Visit www.pta.org/archive_article_details_1190929469218.html to learn more about recommended vaccinations. **At your child's next doctor's appointment**, be sure to ask any questions you may have about vaccinations your child has already had, or those that might be recommended.
- Get a head start on the school year. Go to the school and become familiar with where your child's classes are located. Also, **obtain grade level expectations and benchmarks**.
- Ask your PTA leader about PTA's **Three for Me® Family Involvement Program**. By giving 3 hours of your time to the school, you will not be making a difference for just your child, but for all children that attend the school. Visit www.three4me.com for more information.

On September 22nd, in honor of **National Family Day**, make it a point to eat dinner together as a family. 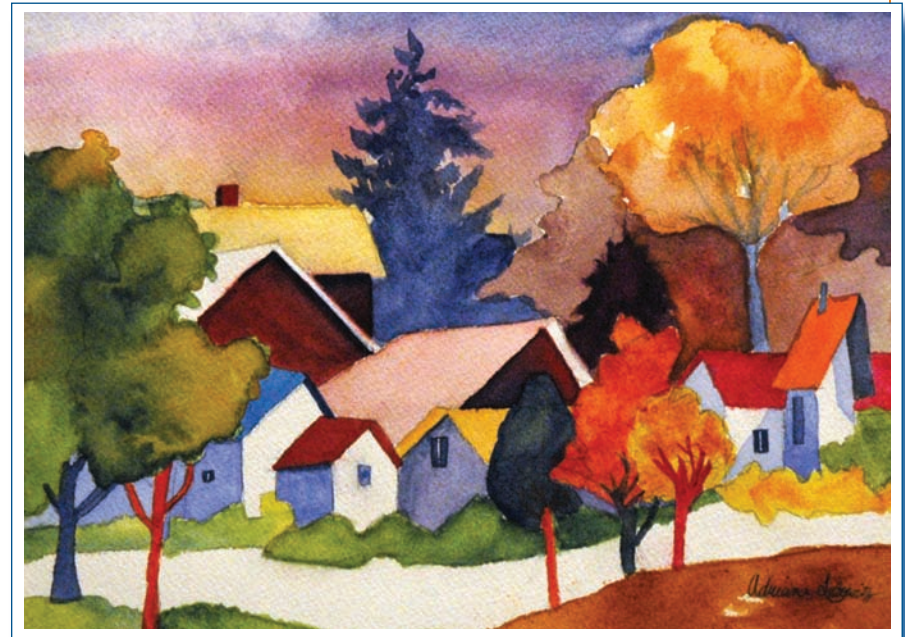

Art has the unique ability to touch every walk and facet of our lives, and to offer the ability to shine outside of the "normal" classroom structure. Make sure to engage your local schools in organizing arts-based activities within the community.

Parent Notes

- On October 8, participate in **International Walk to School Day**. Visit www.walktoschool.org for more information. Also consider talking to other families in your neighborhood about creating a **Walking School Bus**, where parents take turns chaperoning a group of students walking to school.
- Halloween is a fun celebration for kids of all ages. When planning your child's costume, be sure that they can move around safely. Also be sure that children are monitored closely if they go trick-or-treating, and that they can either be seen easily by drivers, or go when there is still plenty of daylight.
- Don't wait for parent-teacher conferences to see how your child is doing in their subject areas. **Get in touch with teachers** and ask how you can continue to support your child's learning.

Once the fire of learning is lit, help keep it burning during the summer months. During the summer months, if your child is not engaged in some type of daily math or reading activity, they can forget up to a month's worth of information gained during the school year. Ask your child's teacher for fun and educational activities to do during the summer months.

Parent Notes

- Time spent away from school over the summer often means more time spent in front of TV and computer screens. **Talk to your kids about their use of different forms of media and technology**, and the ways to be safe while using these. Set aside some time to create or update a media use contract with each of your children. Visit www.netsmartz.org/resources/pledge.htm for a sample.
- During the summer, your child will probably get plenty of physical exercise. Make sure they also get exercise for their minds. **Help keep the brain strong** by making sure they read and remember math concepts that were taught throughout the school year. The summer is also a great time to work on other subject areas that may not get as much attention during the school year, such as social studies, science, and the arts.
- **Ask teachers for a summer reading list** and fun learning activities to do with your child.
- Remember to keep the learning creative and fun. It is summertime and because there is no competition with regular classroom assignments, it's the perfect time to learn new and exciting things. During the summer there are many activities at the library, museums, and parks. **Check you local paper for scheduled summer events and activities.**
